2007 Fact Sheet

Our mission is to end domestic violence by changing individual, institutional and societal beliefs, attitudes and behaviors that perpetuate it. To achieve this we will work with the community to:

- PROVIDE services in East and North King County to people, primarily women and children, who have experienced physical, emotional or sexual abuse;
- PREVENT domestic violence through advocacy, education and support.

Since 1982 Eastside Domestic Violence Program (EDVP) has provided safety, support and accessibility to more than 91,000 victims and their children. EDVP believes that domestic violence will end only when individuals, institutions and society as a whole join together to demand an end to abuse. EDVP supports a comprehensive, coordinated response to domestic violence by working together with systems, organizations, community groups and individuals to end domestic violence.

Overview of Services

24-Hour Crisis Line

Advocacy-based counseling and safety planning — the gateway to all EDVP services.

Community Advocacy

Advocacy-based counseling and education for victims, coordination with the criminal justice system and other services.

Women's Support Groups

Weekly support groups for women in the community facilitated by domestic violence advocates.

Children's and Teen Groups

Weekly groups to help children who have experienced domestic violence.

Latina Outreach Program

Advocacy-based counseling, education and support group for Spanish speaking women and children.

Education & Training

Education for health care professionals, businesses, the criminal justice system, schools, religious communities, social service providers and civic groups.

My Sister's Home

Confidential interim housing and supportive services for families in lethal situations for up to three months.

My Friend's Place

Confidential transitional housing for families in lethal situations dealing with both domestic violence and substance abuse for up to nine months.

Coming Home Program

Transition to permanent housing.

Hotel-Motel Voucher Program

Advocacy and emergency housing services during short stays in motels.

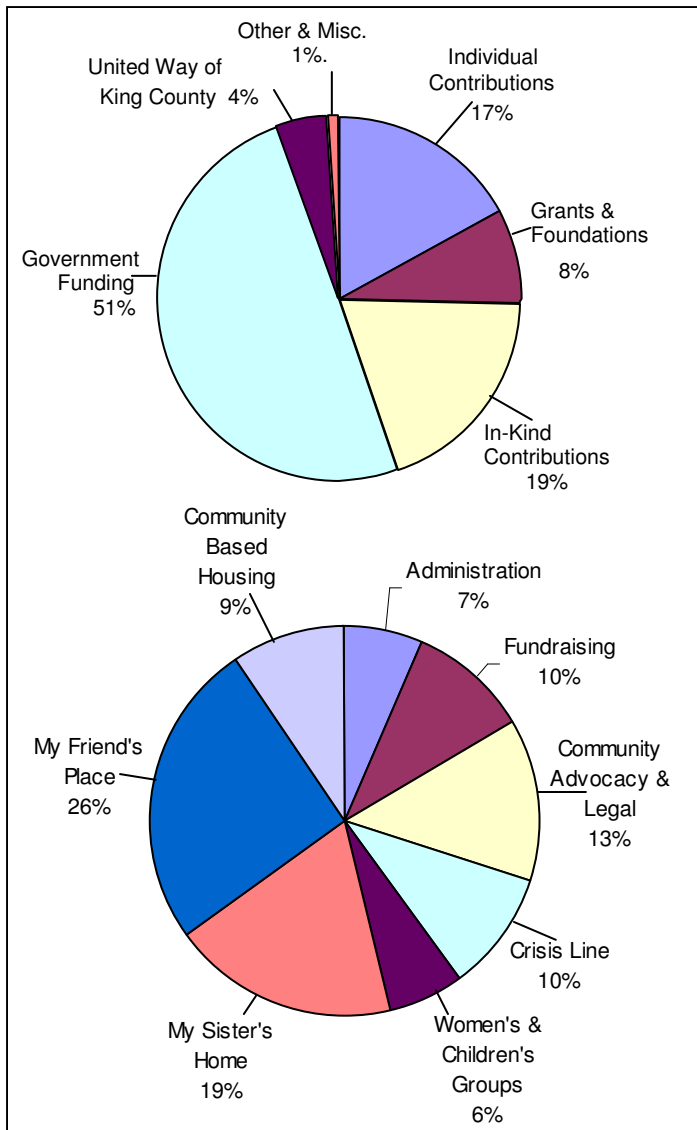
Rent Assistance Program

Financial support and advocacy for six months in permanent housing.
